II. TRANSPARENCY AND INTEREST REPRESENTATION (LOBBYING)

## **Questions:**

• *Do you agree that efforts should be made to bring greater transparency to lobbying?* Yes

• Do you agree that lobbyists who wish to be automatically alerted to consultations by the EU institutions should register and provide information, including on their objectives, financial situation and on the interests they represent?

The European Commission in cooperation with the European Parliament, because in principle a code written by the people who will be regulated by it is likely to be weak - Quis custodet ipsos custodes?

• Do you agree that a new, inclusive external watchdog is needed to monitor compliance and that sanctions should be applied for any breach of the code?

If so, it must be a fully independent public body. As for sanctions, they should not be applied to voluntary registration systems - if lobbyists did not wish to comply with codes and disclosure obligations they would most likely not register given that 'voluntary registration' does not prevent them from lobbying decision-makers.
